



DATA DE-IDENTIFICATION OVERVIEW

Early stage impact study of localised OER in Afghanistan

The authors have administered a de-identification process in which any information which was deemed to have the potential to identify research subjects, whether in isolation or combination with other data, has been either omitted or reworded. In all cases, the authors have attempted to preserve as much of the original data as possible, and have tried to ensure that the integrity of original response was maintained.

The de-identification process utilised one technique:

- **Omission:** Whenever disclosive information was included in a response, certain elements of that response (such as a word or phrase) have been omitted so as to obscure identity, while preserving as much of the intended meaning and salience of the response as possible. To make the data as seamless and interpretable as possible, the authors have not provided indications within the data signalling where the omissions have taken place.

The following information was omitted:

- All contact information
 - Respondent names and other personal information
 - School names
